

I just ordered this book the other day. Someone had it posted on the Physician Assistant Forum website. Once it arrived I opened it and could not put it down. A few years ago I made my decision to transition out of my career in law enforcement and pursue medicine. I was around 34 at the time. I am 37 now. A lot of people have been giving me grief about this but I know I have made the right decision. This book could not have come at a better time. Once I turned 37 I started to question if I was making the right decision and wondering if I was too old to pursue this. Up to that point I had been a very motivated, high achieving student (first time ever I might add). This book help refocus

my commitment to reaching my goal. I enjoyed the authors sense of humor and our two stories are very similar. A must read for anyone pursuing changing careers in mid-life.

I find myself in a position similar to Barry. His story speaks to me as if I were writing it myself. I am almost 47 yrs. old and have spent the last 3 years slogging my way through all the prerequisites for PA school, as well as raising 2 children ages 9 and 12 at the time of starting back to college. With less than one more year of prereq's to finish before I begin applying to PA schools, I'm starting to see some good solid progress toward PA school and my own summer intensive in Anatomy.Barry's insight and descriptives from his first semester in Anatomy to his last final, clinicals, and finally graduating from PA school tells me that I'm doing the right thing.
